August 9, 2007 - The Washington State Patrol Toxicology Laboratory has contacted county prosecutors about an error recently discovered in the calculation of external standard simulator solution reference values. This has resulted in an overestimate by 0.001 to 0.002g/210L in some tests conducted on a breath test instrument in Spokane County (140030), between February 2, 2006, and January 4, 2007. July 26, 2007 - The Washington State Patrol Toxicology Laboratory prepares and tests simulator solutions used in the DataMaster breath testing instruments. Each batch of solution is prepared by a single analyst. Each batch of solution is then examined and tested by multiple analysts and each analyst signs a certificate for use in lieu of live testimony pursuant to CrRLJ 6.13(c)(1).

All certificates signed by Ann Marie Gordon have been removed from this Web Based Discovery Materials Site (WebDMS) as of July 21, 2007, because Ms. Gordon did not personally examine and test the solutions. This applies only to Ms. Gordon's certificates. All other certificates remain on the website.

The test results themselves have not changed.

July 5, 2007 - The State Toxicologist is reinitiating the process of amending the Washington Administrative Code Section WAC Chapter 448-15 concerning approval of portable breath test (PBT) devices.
